Hot Chocolate Pudding

Ingredients:		
4 1/2 cups milk	1/3 cup cornstarch	2 tsp. vanilla extract
3/4 cup sugar	1/4 tsp salt	Whipped cream, for topping
2/3 hot chocolate or cocoa mix	5 large egg yolks, beaten	

- **Step 1** Heat 4 cups of the milk in a large saucepan over medium heat until steaming.
- **Step 2** Meanwhile, whisk the sugar, hot chocolate mix, cornstarch and 1/4 teaspoon salt in a large bowl. Whisk in the egg yolks and the remaining 1/2 cup milk.
- **Step 3** Slowly add half of the hot milk to the egg mixture, whisking constantly until smooth. Gradually whisk the egg-milk mixture into the remaining hot milk in the saucepan and bring to a boil over medium heat, whisking constantly. Continue to cook, whisking constantly, until the mixture has thickened to a pudding-like consistency, 3 to 4 minutes. Remove the saucepan from the heat and stir in the vanilla.
- **Step 4** Let the pudding cool slightly, stirring a few times to prevent a skin from forming. Place a piece of plastic wrap directly on the surface of the pudding and refrigerate until it has completely cooled and thickened, about 4 hours.

Thousands of frogs reportedly fell during a thunderstorm on Gilbraltar on the Iberian Peninsula, alive and jumpy. It also reportedly happened in France in 1889, Minneapolis in 1901, and England in 1894. Frog rain happens more often that you'd think.

Pop Culture History:

Wonder Bread began distribution. It went national in 1925 when the Continental Baking Company bought out Taggard baking, the originators of the product.

Betty Crocker was not a real person. The name was created as a way to give a personalized response to consumer product questions. The name Betty was selected because it was a cherry all-American name, and Crocker was the last name of one of the company directors at that time.

Albert Einstein won the Nobel Prize for Physics for his work on Solar Power, not his 1916 work "The General Theory of Relativity."

The largest civil uprising in US history since the Civil War occurred when 10,000 coal miners battled 3,000 police officers and "strikebreakers." The coal miners were attempting to unionize the coal mines of West Virginia. US Troops were eventually brought in by Presidential Order.

A dog named "Dormie" went on trial in San Francisco for allegedly murdering 14 cats. He walked. (Read more about the trial on page 11)

The shortest-lived team in NFL history was the Tonawanda Kardex Lumbermen, who played in one NFL game in 1921. Tonawanda is in New York, a suburb of Buffalo.

The Black Sox Scandal: Eight Chicago White Sox players were banned for life for purposefully losing the World Series to the Cincinnati Reds. They were all acquitted in criminal court.

The Buffalo All-Americans were announced as NFL champions until the Chicago Bears challenged them to a final game which became the first ever postseason NFL game which the Bears won 10-7, stealing the championship title from Buffalo.

Most of the 1890 US census data no longer exists due to a fire in 1921.

Willis Meadows coughed up a bullet 58 years after he was shot in the eye during the Civil War.

Biggest Pop Artists of 1921 included: Nora Bayes, Eddie Cantor, Frank Crumit, Carl Fenton and His Orchestra, Mariona Harris, Art Hickman & His Orchestra, Al Jolson, Billy Jones, Isham Jones and His Orchestra, Benny Krueger and His Orchestra, Ted Lewis and his Band, Billy Murray, The Original Dixieland Band, The Peerless Quartet, Leo Reisman and His Orchestra, Mamie Smith & Her Jazz Hounds, Van & Schenck, Ethel Waters, Reinald Werrenrath, Paul Whiteman and His Orchestra, and Yerkes Jzarimba Orchestra.

- 3. **Swinging Balls of Fire** In Scotland, New Year's is celebrated with a three-day festival called Hogmanay. The festival begins with tens of thousands of people marching through the streets of Edinburgh swinging torches of fire. The tradition dates back to the Vikings and is believed to be linked to the Winter Solstice.
- 4. **Taking your Suitcase for a Walk** In Ecuador, if you plan to travel in the coming year, you are supposed to run around the block (or house) with a suitcase at midnight to enjoy success during your travels.
- 5. **Take the Polar Plunge** Done all over the world, this tradition is running into frigid water on New Year's Day, usually for charity, because giving back is a good way to start off the New Year.
- 6. **Chair Jumping** People in Denmark jump off of chairs at midnight to ensure their feet are in the air going into the new year. This is thought to leave any bad mojo behind by making sure their feet are firmly planted on the ground when they land in the next year.
- 7. **Pomegranate Throwing** In Greece, people hurl pomegranates on the ground at the stroke of midnight. The more pieces the fruit bursts into, the more abundance you can expect in the coming year.
- 8. **Dressing Up Like Bears** In Romania, dressing up in bear costumes, and dancing from house to house, is a tradition meant to keep evil at bay.
- 9. **Furniture Throwing** In South Africa and Italy, if you're moving, and your furniture fits through your window, throw it away so that you start the new year off fresh.
- 10. **Graveyard Camping** In Chile, the tradition of camping in graveyards on New Year's Eve is so you start off the new year with your deceased friends and family.
- 11. **Dropping Ice Cream on the Floor** In Switzerland, people drop a scoop of ice cream on the floor at midnight to manifest abundance in the coming year.

More History from 1921

Dormie: A Rich Man's Dog Tried for Cat Murder—Dormie made history in 1921 when he was tried for the murder of 14 cats in San Francisco. Dormie, a full-blooded Airedale, belonged to a wealthy man named Eaton McMillan. He was charged with killing 14 cats, the principal victim being Sunbeam (a Persian-Angora cat owned by Marjorie Ingals), and went on trial before a jury. According to the Los Angeles Herald, 21 December 1921: "It was the first time in the history of jurisprudence that a canine has been brought to trial for a capital crime. This was no matter for the city

"pound" department, or the cruelty to animals commission. It was a real trial of a real dog on a real charge of murder." It was also reported that the court was uncertain whether to try him of 14 murders or 126 murders (taking into consideration the nine lives of each cat) and whether a jury of his peers should be dogs. "If a jury trial is agreed upon, only a jury of dogs can legally be employed. For only dogs are the equals of dogs." James Brennan, Dormie's attorney, said most Airedales were of a higher order than most men, so the question of equality was quickly dropped.

During the trial, Brennan had other Airedales, other breeds of dogs and Dormie come into the courtroom so Ingals could identify the culprit. She did identify Dormie, but the identification was set aside since he was the only dog that was escorted into the room by a policeman. The defense argued that Dormie was a friendly dog and was loved by many of the neighborhood kids. A character witness was even brought in, an Airedale named Rowdy - who was the brother of Laddie Boy, President Harding's dog. Rowdy, who had been a personal bodyguard of a Persian cat for many years (and who mourned for days after the cat's death), was to show the jury that Airedales did not hate cats.

The trial ended with a hung jury. Eleven jurors voted to acquit, while only one wanted Dormie to receive the death penalty. Brennan filed a motion for dismissal. The Judge granted the motion, declaring that the San Francisco ordinance, which put Dormie on trial, was contrary to the Constitution of the State of California. According to the law at that time, a licensed dog had the right to roam free and unlicensed pets like cats did not. Therefore, if a wandering cat encountered a free-roaming dog, it was the cat's responsibility if harmed.


