

Benefits and Medicare Update

Fall brings upon us its own set of "to do" items. Medicare open enrollment is open from October 15 through December 7. If you need assistance with looking at new plans, please call or come and see us to set up a time to review and look at options. This is also a great time to see if you may be eligible for Medicare extra help. Medicare extra help assists with Medicare part D prescription costs and is available for low-income seniors.

October 1st (until September 30, 2023) also marks the opening of the new season for heating assistance applications. Don't be afraid to reapply now even if you still have a credit balance. The heating assistance program only counts what you are "billed", not your account balance. Higher income levels (\$2123 for a single individual and \$2168 per couple) will provide many seniors with money to pay for rising heating costs. If you have questions or need assistance with the application process, we are here to help!

all a little surprised at the amount? Being Alaskans we just


deal with it and go about our business.

HONORING VETERANS DAY

Note: This December, 1998 article from the Gettysburg Times is written about my Great Uncle Walter. He was married to my mother's Aunt Mary, who passed away in 1955. With Aunt Mary gone, the family kept him in the family because we loved him so much.

In his 1999 obituary (at age 103), it was noted Uncle Walter was born to a Mennonite family in Pennsylvania in October, 1895; he graduated from Normal School (a teacher training college) in 1917 (unallowable by Mennonite faith); went on to receive bachelor's and master's degrees from Pennsylvania State University (Penn State); was a veteran of WWI; received the French Legion of Honor by the French government in 1998; began his teaching career in a one-room schoolhouse; following the war he taught school, as a principal, and also was a vocational agriculture teacher and advisor to a local chapter of the Future Farmers of America; served as a master teacher for several Penn State Agriculture Education students; worked in the Penn State agriculture education department; served as an advisor of vocational education in Iran (during the Shah's reign); and, received the Honorary American Farmer Degree.

Uncle Walter was a kind, gentle, and humble man; had a twinkling sense of humor; was a HUGE Penn State football enthusiast; and, always wore a dress shirt and bowtie. Best of all, he was my Uncle Walter. ~ Carol Freas

French Government Honors Area Vet for WWI Service

Toasted with glasses of golden champagne and a traditional salutatory kiss on the cheek, 103-year old Walter L. Hess received the French Legion of Honor


Thursday for his military service in World War I.

"Thank you very much. This is a pretty nice affair," the frail, white-haired man said after a red-ribboned Knight's Cross was pinned to his suit lapel by French Associate Consul Anne-M. Roux. "I sure am honored today," Hess told two dozen relatives and friends gathered for the small official ceremony at the Gettysburg Lutheran Home.

And 80 years after his fighting days in France, a little of the old, proud soldier that has yet to fade away showed when Hess struggled to stand at attention amid the playing of the national anthems "La Marseillaise" and "Star Spangled Banner."

Roux said Hess is among more than 300 American veterans of World War I receiving France's highest national honor during the 80th anniversary of the Armistice signed in Rethondes. She said it is a gesture to acknowledge the sacrifice by individuals and United States in helping France.

She said there is still a strong sentiment among French citizens for the "doughboy" soldiers, though it is a war hardly remembered by younger generations of Americans. "We realize the first World War was a slaughter. France and its allies lost many, many young men," the embassy official said.




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"They fought in trenches. They died of the gases. They died with the winter and cold. It was a very bad war. They fought with bayonets and within ten yards there was a German," she said.

A 22-year-old rural school teacher in Bucks County who had been raised on a Lancaster County farm, Hess was the unlikeliest of soldiers to fight in the "war to end all wars" when he boarded a train in Lancaster in May 1918 after being drafted for Army service, he knew little of living in another country, let alone fighting a foreign enemy.

Given an olive drab uniform and serial number 3106395, the Millersville native



They listened to songs like "Goodbye Broadway Hello France," "L-B-E-R-T-Y," "Goodbye Mother Machree," and "Mademoiselle from Armetiers." With the purple and white Cross of Lorraine patch on his left uniform sleeve and a wagon wheel on his right, Hess became a wagoner in Co. F 304th Engineers, 79th Division. He considered himself lucky to be among soldiers who were housed in a shed and fed four meals a day when he arrived in France.

After hearing the cursing of officers urging men to work, the young vocational agriculture teacher decided he was not suited to the brutal daily routine in the mud-filled trenches.

"I went to see the man in charge of the animals. I said, "Listen, if you need someone here, you call on me," Hess recalled. "He said O.K. and in a little while I was sent to him. I drove the wagon. of A four-line team, "he recalled of his driving duties in the era when wagons, mules and horses and railways were the main source

of transportation.

His first real indoctrination in to the brutal final days of the fighting came during the "Meuse-Argonne offensive from Sept. 21 to Oct. 6, 1918. "They were getting ready. We sat on the ground that night," he said in describing artillery fire before the attack. "We could read the newspaper without any problem when they shot the guns over our heads."

Hess celebrated his 23rd birthday as his unit moved from Argonne through the Trayvon Sector to Montfaucon for another showdown with German troops. Yet, like many young men who had a sense of being able to survive or escape unscathed from almost any situation, Hess said he did not feel much fear as he prepared for battle.

"I wasn't scared of anything," Hess said. "I was waiting for it to come and happen to me, but it never did."

News of the Armistice was overwhelming for many of the soldiers, Hess recalled. Some men were so happy they tossed their guns and started looking for keepsakes and spoils. "All of a sudden, some of them were underground. They were hunting for souvenirs from the battle," he said. "Later that day, they decided that they should have a going over of us – an inspection. We were all standing in the lines, but these two young men were out in the woods hunting for guns so they could be inspected," Hess added.

He was among the soldiers who remained in France as the war drew to a close. "Another soldier and I who were friends decided we were going to stick together. But he got sent to England," he recalled. "I took some long walks and met some good people."

While attending some academic classes offered by the Army while staying at Clermont-Ferrand University, Hess saw President Woodrow Wilson and other Allied dignitaries and advisers walking around the same complex in the days before the signing of the Versailles Treaty.

"They said we could go into every one of the buildings, except one. And that one was the one that was where everything was being set for signing of the treaty."

The president and several other men were walking across the field there," he said, also remembering the British Prime Minister David Lloyd George and the French Premier Georges Clemenceau. "I saw them all."

As the treaty was signed on June 28, 1919, Hess was preparing to return to the United States and be discharged, which happened on July 30, 1919. He was paid \$96.76 at his separation from the Army, including \$60 in bonus pay.

However, he still does not consider his 13 months of war service as heroic or exceptional. "I don't think so. It didn't seem to me," he said, adding he was surprised to hear he was receiving the Legion of Honor.


Hess and the war buddy eventually met again in the United States and they both attended Pennsylvania State University, where he earned bachelor and master's degrees. "He was a wonderful guy. He let you use his wagon if you needed it," he said while showing people a

photograph of him and the friend dressed in their old Army uniforms for a Memorial Day ceremony in the early 1920s.

Hess said his saddest memory of the war was receiving news from home that his younger sister had died during a flu epidemic. It struck him as ironic that he would survive the hazards of war, but the girl at home died of disease. "She was two years younger than me. She was a cracker jack. She knew more than I did. The officer told me that my sister had died. When he finished, I saluted with my left hand," he recalled. "I was looking forward to seeing her and being with her when I got home," he said.

In looking back upon his life, Hess expressed a sense of contentment. "I guess it's a long, full life," he said. "I never figured it would be anything but that."

Feel familiar? Confused? You're not alone. Let us explain why we do what we do! When a person comes in for lunch or any activity really, there is a two-step process.

Step 1: Sign in at the Kiosk for each activity you plan to attend (including lunch).


Why is this necessary, you might ask? This information is reported to the State of Alaska (SOA) and the Kenai Peninsula Borough (KPB). Both contribute funding to the Kenai Senior Center (KSC) budget. The KSC also receives .70 cents return on every meal provided to seniors. This funding, in addition to donations, is how the program keeps the cost of meals at just \$7.00 each. As food costs continue to rise it will be difficult to keep the cost of lunch down without the funding to support it.

Step 2: Place your meal ticket in the box.

Is this necessary? It doesn't have my name on it. For those of you paying attention yes, we did skip a step. Yes, the next step normally would be that you would purchase your lunch ticket to place in the box however part of our funding requires that we give every individual the opportunity to pay whatever they can afford - anonymously. Some of you use the box to make extra donations, thank you! Every donation is helpful.

Now let us put it together. We don't need your name on the ticket when you sign in at the kiosk. We already know you're getting a meal. When we count the number of meal tickets, the number of lunches served, and the number of people signing in to the Kiosk, we are providing significantly more meals than the number of individuals that have signed in. This costs the program lost revenue and doesn't show exactly how many people benefit from what we do. You can help us, just by signing in.

Starting in November, twice per week, two individuals will be chosen randomly from those who signed into the kiosk that day. The prize? As a way to say thank you for helping us to


