


Center's Halloween Trick or Treat festivities.

Executive Proclamation by Governor Mike Dunleavy

WHEREAS, many Alaskans suffer from chronic illness or pain and are disabled or otherwise in need of ongoing care; and

WHEREAS, family caregivers selflessly devote their time and energy to caring for loved ones who cannot care for themselves, and through their steadfast commitment, reflect the very best of family and community life; and

WHEREAS, caregivers shoulder long hours and heavy responsibilities, from medical and personal care to companionship and financial support, all while balancing the responsibilities of their own lives; and

WHEREAS, an estimated 94,000 family and other informal caregivers in Alaska provide almost 88 million hours of uncompensated care annually with an estimated economic value of more than \$1.7 billion; and

WHEREAS, caregiving, though deeply meaningful, can weigh heavily on caregivers, placing them at risk emotionally, physically and financially, yet these challenges can be eased when caregivers take steps to protect their own health and well-being; and

WHEREAS, Family Caregivers Month is an opportunity to honor the dedication and sacrifice of family caregivers and the invaluable benefit they bring to our communities, while also raising awareness of the urgent need for public commitment to provide caregivers with the support, resources, and recognition they need to continue their essential role.

NOW THEREFORE, I, Mike Dunleavy, GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF ALASKA, do hereby proclaim November 2025 as:

Family Caregivers Month

in Alaska and encourage all Alaskans to recognize the importance of family caregivers and the support they provide to vulnerable loved ones, and to further support them as they take time to rest, recharge, and care for themselves.

Know your Neighbor: Shirie Drath

Have you ever noticed when you enter the dining room at the Senior Center that the tables are always decorated with seasonal center pieces? Always bright and colorful and so welcoming. We have the ladies from the sewing room to thank for the mats and the beautiful floral arrangements are the creations of Shirie.

Shirie Drath is our resident floral arrangement creator; but there is so much more to her story! Shirie tells me she was born in Exeter, California and grew up as a rancher's daughter. Her father had a citrus ranch and grew Navel and Valencia oranges on 40 acres in the foothills of the Sequoia National Park. She went to Kaweah Grammar School and walked 1½ mile in the country to that small town through the 8th grade with only 50 students in the whole school. She graduated from 1st Union High School in Exeter, with 110 students in her graduating class. She went on to College at the University of Pacific in Stockton, CA. Her major was in Elementary

Education and an interest in music. She studied Piano, Organ and Voice. She went back to her home town in the summer months and worked as a Swimming Instructor in the next town of Visalia. That is where she met Jim, who was the Program Director for the YMCA there. They started dating in the summer of "62, (isn't there a song called that?), and got married in 1964. She said they loved star-gazing, and I imagined he had his eyes on her more than the stars.

When she graduated from college, she taught elementary school. She had acquired both Special education and Regular Education for Kindergarten through 8th grade in California. Her special Education credential is for Orthopedically handicapped including cerebral palsy children.

They have two children. A daughter named Julia Anne, who still lives in California, and a son named Jimmie Jack who owns Jimmie Jack Alaska Fishing and Lodges on the peninsula.

Shirie says that in 1983 they both decided to quit their jobs and move to Alaska. No jobs, no home, just 2 adults, two kids and a golden retriever headed north to Alaska. They landed in the Mat-Su Valley and within 30 days they both had jobs. She started teaching 4th grade in Wasilla and Jim was hired on as a Security Guard on the Trans-Alaskan Pipe -Line, where he worked for 20 years and retired as a Captain in 2002. After retiring from TAPS, he continued fishing with their son and guided on the Kenai for 20 years. Shirie continued on teaching for a couple more years and she retired in 2004.

Shirie tells me she always wanted to be an interior designer but her dad discouraged her by telling her and her sister that they had to be a teacher or a nurse. She became the teacher and her sister the nurse. She said that, she had been selling Real Estate and wanted to change. She got two offers on the same day. One was for her dream job of being an Interior designer, and the other to teach again (She had taken off 10 years to raise her children). She had always been recognized for her beautifully decorated classrooms. She chose teaching and that is what she is remembered for.



Alaska Department of Health Division of Public Assistance

Overview

The Senior Benefits Program pays cash benefits to Alaskan seniors who are aged 65 or older and have low to moderate income. Cash payments are \$125, \$175, or \$250 each month depending on other income. The income limits for each payment level are tied to the Alaska Federal Poverty Guidelines and change each year as the poverty level changes.

Who qualifies?

To be eligible for Senior Benefits, an individual must meet the following eligibility criteria:

- Be age 65 or older
- Be an Alaskan resident
- Be a U.S. citizen or Qualified Alien
- Have a Social Security Number or proof that one has been applied for
- Have countable income that does not exceed the income limits.

Resources, such as savings, do not count for Senior Benefits.

She tells the story that after she retired, she got a call from her old boss who wanted her to come back and teach for a semester on the slope in Wainwright, Alaska. One of her "bucket List' things to do was to teach in a village in Alaska. She calls it the "Icing on the Cake" of her 30 years of teaching. After convincing Jim, she could do this she packed up her things and flew to Wainwright in January of 2005. When she got there, she realized that this was a hostile environment for teachers. The kids were determined that they were go-

ing to run her off like they had done all the other teachers before. THEY HADN'T MET MRS. DRATH YET! She wasn't scared of them and she stood her ground. She eventually gained their respect and watched them turn the corner and really start learning to read and learn. She loved the kids and got them to read and improve so much that the parents wanted her to stay.

She wanted to do a couple of things while there that most don't get to do. She persuaded the custodian to take her out to the whaling camp with him when she heard that a whale had been harpooned and she got to witness the whole harvesting process. They had travelled 17 miles over frozen ocean just in time for her to grab the cable and help 80+ villagers, chanting in unison to pull the 42-foot whale on the ice. When the whale got on the ice the lines went slack and everyone fell into the snow. She learned later that her principal was jealous because he had been trying for three years to get to do this. Her

high school boys took her out ice fishing and she showed the boys that she could fish, knew how to clean her fish and knew the difference between the male and females. They exchanged her fish and kept the "roe "for themselves and she called them out on it. They were quite surprised she knew the difference.

Shirie and Jim moved to Kenai 2012 and he kept fishing with his son. She says they loved fishing and travelling together. She states that Family and travelling are very important to her. She shared many pictures with me of the trips to foreign countries and all the family holidays together. That is why she has photography as a hobby. She loves pictures of family, fun and adventure. She says she played the organ for many years for her church and weddings. She loves music and picture taking. If you visit her, you will see many family pictures on her wall. Just sit down and talk to


Our \$5-A-Month Club is a voluntary membership to the Kenai Senior Center through the Kenai Senior Connection, Inc. and a valuable help!




