



# TRANSPORTATION IS BACK!!!



We are happy to announce Senior Center rides are now available! Here are important things to remember:

# What days are rides available?

At this time, rides will be from 9:00am-4:00pm, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday.

# Are masks required in the vehicles?

Yes, while in the van, MASKS ARE REQUIRED.

#### Does this include rides to the doctor?

Doctor appointments do take precedence over other rides, so please schedule these rides at least 24 hours in advance and remember, transportation begins at 9:00 am. For doctor appointments in Soldotna, we schedule pick-up times for at least one-half hour prior to the doctor appointment.

## Can I get a ride to the Senior Center?

Yes. Rides to the Center for lunch and home after lunch will be available.

#### What is the cost to ride the van?

The Senior Center is funded through grants and donations, so there are some costs related to services. These are very minimal compared to other transportation options. Rides donations are \$3, \$6, and \$10 and based on **round trip** from various locations, as explained below. These donation amounts are also posted inside each van. Donations can be given to the Driver or the Receptionist at the Senior Center.

# How do I arrange a ride?

Ride scheduling is made through the front desk, so please call **283-8211** or **283-4156** to make reservations. Drivers do not have the ability of scheduling while they are driving, so please call the Center directly or stop by the front desk. We are happy to help!

# Can I make an extra stop during my ride?

Yes. Any additional stops are a donation of \$3.00 To help with scheduling, please schedule these extra stops when you make your ride request.

# What if my appointment takes a while -will the driver wait for me?

This will depend on the schedule for the day. If the driver has another ride scheduled, they can come back after your appointment to pick you up.

# I love to come to the Senior Center for activities and lunch, but I cannot afford to always donate towards my ride?

We understand not everyone's budget is the same and your driver will never ask if you have paid for a ride. Any donation is greatly appreciated.

# Reminder Alaska Telephone Customers!



On <u>October 24, 2021</u>, it will be <u>required</u> to enter the Alaska Area Code (907) when calling **ANY** local calls. Remember to update any and all of your automatic phone contacts by adding the (907) prior to the local number.

Things to remember:

- Your telephone number, including current area code will not change.
- The price of a call, coverage area, or other rates and services will not change due to the dialing change.
- What is a local call now will remain a local call regardless of the number of digits dialed.
- You can still dial just three digits to reach 711 (relay services) and 911 (emergency services).
- You will continue to dial 1+ the area code + telephone number for all long-distance calls.

# Do you know someone who would like a Fidget Blanket?

Seniors with Alzheimer's and Dementia who have restless hands use sensory blankets, also called fidget blankets.

The blanket allows the seniors to use their hands and alleviate agitation by giving them something on which to focus.

The ancient Celtic festival of Samhain is the original Halloween. The origins of most of the famous Western Halloween traditions are found here. On Samhain, people began preparing for winter, bringing their herds back from their summer pastures and slaughtering livestock. As summer dissolved into winter, it was believed that the border between the world of the living and the world of the dead dissolved as well.

So, for one night, the souls of the dead, spirits, and fairy folk could easily cross into the physical world. To disguise themselves from evil spirits, people would dress in costumes. Then, they'd go from house to house reciting poetry in exchange for food. The souls of dead ancestors were honored with feasts, and bonfires were lit to keep the darkness at bay. Jack-o'-lanterns were carved out of turnips to frighten evil spirits away.

Some of these traditions, like costumes, jack-o'-lanterns and trick-or-treating, carried over into modern-day Halloween and are celebrated around the world. However, other Samhain traditions, like divination games and eating traditional foods, never attained the same global popularity.

Here are just a few Samhain traditions that are particular to Ireland and Scotland:

#### Ireland

- Dublin hosts a Samhain parade every year.
- Colcannon (mashed potatoes mixed with kale or cabbage) and barmbrack (sweet bread with dried fruits) are the traditional foods. Barmbrack is used for fortune-telling: charms are added to the loaf, and your fortune for the next year depends on which charm you find in your piece of barmbrack.

#### Scotland

• Sausage has been a traditional Scottish Samhain food since ancient times. In fact, the Witchcraft Act of 1735 actually made it illegal to eat pork pastries on Halloween. Fortunately, the act was repealed in the 1950s. Sausage rolls for everyone!



# A FAVORITE RECIPE:

The following recipe was found on a Hersey's Cocoa box by my mother, Lois Mohn. The original recipe called for one cup of nuts. My granddaughter, Hilary Hanson, not caring for nuts, thought we should substitute mini chocolate chips. The result was a winner.

## **Cocoa Brownies**

2/3 cup flour

1/3 cup cocoa

½ teaspoon baking powder

½ teaspoon salt

2 eggs

1 cup packed dark brown sugar

1 teaspoon vanilla

1/3 cup salad oil

1 cup mini chocolate chips

Sift together flour, cocoa, baking powder and salt. Set aside.

In a mixing bowl slightly beat eggs. Gradually stir in sugar.
Add vanilla and oil and mix well.
Stir in flour – cocoa mixture and then chocolate chips.

Spread in a 9 by 9 inch greased pan and bake at 350 degrees for 25 minutes. Cool in pan then cut.

#### "TALK ABOUT SCARY"

When we talk about "scary," we often mean the "O-o-o! Shake in your boots!" kind of scary (ala Halloween, masks, costumes, etc.). But there are some other, possibly even deeper meanings to the word. For some people the very thought of becoming very ill is scary. For others, there is a fear of losing their job, position, or some such that could well be called scary. In my case, I would suggest that the year 2010 when Friend Wife was diagnosed with Stage 4 ovarian cancer and initiated the scariest period in my life. The fact that she was given an estimated six months to live also contributed to the apprehension.

As I thought of the possibility of Janice's death, my mind had "reruns" of the 54 years we had been married. Such good times! There were some not-so-good times also...such as the death of our youngest daughter at age 16 (just weeks before graduating from high school), or the "less than desirable" move we made at one time. Altogether, however, they were wonderful years. And now...this abrupt, totally unanticipated news.

As a Christian, I am keenly aware that nothing in our lives is a surprise to God. Therefore, He knows about this also. So, whereas faith looks to God for answers, yet Jesus, God's Son, made use of human resources to accomplish some of His miracles.

Following three chemo shots (one per month), surgery was performed in Seattle. We waited (no wonder they call it the "waiting room," one does a lot of waiting there). Afterward, we awaited the doctor's

report. He stated: "It went very well. We were able to get all we saw."

After three more monthly chemo shots, we began a series of checkups. Seven years later Friend Wife was told that she could be called the Poster Child for recovery from ovarian cancer.

Was it scary? Yes. Did I need to live in fear? No. The Bible says: "Thou wilt keep him in perfect peace whose mind is stayed on Thee." (Isa. 26:3).




