

At the 2024 Old Timer's Luncheon, we asked this of the participants. Here are the responses:



What surprised me most when I moved to Alaska was...

The taste of the milk. I loved dairy fresh milk. Alaskan milk-yuk! It was powdered. (I was 8 years old).

That people ate beef and not moose.

My first Breakup. There was enough water in the unpaved roads to float a canoe with ice underneath and potholes plenty. One could put 2 tires of a vehicle in 2 different potholes at the same time! Not funny at the time, but now a funny memory!

I couldn't see the pavement lines in the winter. I never had that problem in southern California. And the price of lettuce.

How hot it was in Fairbanks on June 14, 1962.

I'm from Oregon with lots of hills. My first day working at UNOCAL, I was in the Prill Tower looking at the scenery. I was surprised at how flat this area is. Many years later I worked in Texas – same things, flat as a plate.

I was born here.

The nature, fresh air, and some very friendly people.

How much more modern it was – land had to be purchased not homesteaded! (We arrived in 1964)

Homesteading.

How much the kids played outside.

All the hard work clearing our homestead and building our basement. Proving up on the homestead. Our outhouse that had a cracked toilet seat and no door. How friendly the people were. (1957) How big Alaska was.



I was born here, but let when I was 2 years old, came back at age 14, because of what was taught in the schools down south. I thought everyone lived in igloos, and was happy they didn't.

I was a baby (1950), but I guess it was the snow.

How much Alaska grew.

The beautiful mountains with snow peaks- and long daylight!

When we came into Palmer, I couldn't believe how friendly the first two people we met were. We spent the night with them. They took us to Anchorage the next day and we spent another night with them and became "fast friends".

Every day is a surprise, magical and majestic.

The people – wholesome population, congeniality and honesty.

Keith and the snow.

The number of kids named Navarre.

I came from England to the area of the Black Hills of South Dakota and said I was in God's country. Then we moved to Kenai in 1969 and I came onto the Peninsula. I said "I thought South Dakota was God's country, now I know I am." I have lived here 55 years.

How warm the winters were.

Was born here.

How beautiful it is everywhere. It feels like we are next door to Heaven. I can't imagine that Heaven is prettier than Alaska.

I was born in Alaska as was my mother, Bertha VanZanten. My dad came in 1938, Morris L. Porter. So, I was born in old Providence in January 1943. Moved to remote homesite in Kachemak Bay in 1945, Kenai in 1950, and homesteaded in 1956.

I was born here – in Anchorage – old Providence on $9^{\rm th}$ and L.

I was born in the old Providence in Anchorage in 1944. So.....first reaction – whoa – how blessed to be in this beautiful place!

All the wild flowers. Anchorage was a big city and I wasn't expecting tall buildings.

Friendly people. Helpful to a new Alaskan.

How friendly and giving the people I met were.

There was no snow "all" the time! I could garden some outside.

The volcano at the end of my street.

4th Avenue, Anchorage

No cars and no people.

No igloos – warmer than Minnesota. Carrs had just opened – fresher and more varieties – rampant drugs – wanted to go home! Teachers left a lot to be desired.

The trees! I was used to big Washington trees. There were so small. The tundra.

My health got better when I brought a friend up here and I stayed.

IDK. I just fell in love with Alaska.

How friendly every was and how peaceful.

How warm it was.

That Dad and I made it in our Model A in 1952.

Everything closed at 6 pm.

Gasoline and food prices.

How cold it was in the winter. How nice the people are in Alaska. How much Mother Nature is involved. My wife liked it enough not to go back to California. We all know how big Alaska is – My gosh it's huge!

I was born here!

How beautiful Alaska really is!

The cold – came from Puerto Rico as a child.

The lovely mountains and less traffic.

First lived at 18.5 mile, Chena Hot Springs Road, Fairbanks. I built a cabin and raised chickens, turkeys, pigs, and Tibetan Mastifs. My Dog, King, starred in the movie, *Man's Best Friend*. The first winter it was -82 degrees.

The height of the mountains. Growing up in Colorado and climbing 14ers, I was no stranger to tall mountains. But they often began at 11,000 feet. Mountains like Redoubt start at sea level and short 10,000 feet up.

How at home I felt.

The hush of dawn, where mountains kiss the sky, the breath of ice that whispers through the pines, and nights adorned with curtains of light. So high, they paint the heavens with a quiet fire, and above all, the way I was welcomed here, by the marvelous hearts of the people here.

How many will warn my five-foot-tall wife: "Don't get caught out in the rain...If you get wet, you might shrink even shorter". And all this with a hearty laugh. On more than one occasion Bill has instructed me to: "Take the rest of the week off". (It was Friday afternoon.)

Folate and Folic Acid on the Nutrition and Supplement Facts Labels What is folate?

How is folate listed on the Nutrition **Facts label and Supplement Facts** label?

The mcg DFE is the unit of measure for folate on the Nutrition Facts and Supplement Facts label. The measure of mcg DFE is used because the body has an easier time absorbing folic acid than folate. A % DV is shown for the total amount of folate in a product, and if any of the total folate comes from folic acid, that amount of folic acid is listed in mcg in parentheses.


